

Kerri Woodberry, MD, MBA, FACS is an Associate Professor in the Department of Surgery at West Virginia University. She currently serves as the Division Chief and Residency Program Director in Plastic Surgery.

Dr. Woodberry graduated from Vanderbilt University with a BA degree in Chemistry and a minor in Mathematics. She received her medical degree from Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine where she served on the Admissions Committee. She subsequently completed a residency in General Surgery at Union Memorial Hospital in Baltimore, MD where she was Chief Resident and Co- Leader of the House Staff Association. She continued her medical training in Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery at The Ohio State University and subsequently completed a Hand Fellowship in Orthopedics at The University of Pennsylvania. She was Assistant Professor in Plastic Surgery and Section Chief of Hand Surgery at Saint Louis University, Assistant to the Program Director for the Plastic Surgery residency program and member of the Medical School Admissions Committee. She relocated to her hometown of Nashville, TN in 2003 to join the Murfreesboro Medical Clinic in a group practice as a Plastic Surgeon, while also obtaining her Executive MBA at Vanderbilt University.

She worked as a Plastic Surgeon at the Murfreesboro Medical Clinic 2003- 2007 and later became founder and CEO of The Macourlyn Center for Plastic Surgery from 2008-2019. While in Nashville, she completed the Physician Leadership College of the Tennessee Medical Association and served as the Secretary/ Treasurer of the Rutherford County Stones River Academy of Medicine. She currently serves on the West Virginia University Medical School Admissions Committee and on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committees. In addition, her clinical research interests include breast and body surgery, upper extremity trauma and soft tissue tumors.
